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About the Exhibition

We are surrounded by animals, plants, and all manner of other things that lie within our grasp. We have a desire to overcome the problems of the Earth as if we were dancing with all of the forms of existence that surround us. This year, the 21st Century Museum of Contemporary Art, Kanazawa will hold this exhibition in response to the annual theme of new ecologies as it celebrates its 20th anniversary. Through the keen sensitivities and faculties of observation of artists, this exhibition will present the future of a comprehensive ecological theory with the capacity to take into account society and the psyche. In collaboration with scientists, philosophers, and other researchers who share the same vision, the exhibition will visualize a range of specialized content and imbue it with sensitivity, conveying it to viewers as a form of sensory learning. Artists and creators from Africa, North and South America, Asia, Europe, including those in remote areas, will gather in the space of the museum to share their wisdom on how to survive alongside life and living beings, as if we were dancing with each other. This vision that encompasses all things in Kanazawa, the birthplace of D.T. Suzuki and philosopher Kitaro Nishida, will serve as a platform for symbiotic relationships.

Exhibition Features

A platform to dance

Now that the planet Earth we inhabit is facing a crisis, we want to connect with all others (multispecies). Dance offers us a way to empathize that transcends language, and in this exhibition, art will serve as the platform for that dance. The "vibe," a sense of vitality and energy generated by these diverse artworks by contemporary artists who work all over the world, the indigenous peoples of the Amazon, and flower arrangement artists from Kanazawa, invites viewers to join in this dance of empathy.

A platform as a place of learning

Through cross-disciplinary collaborations between artists, cultural anthropologists, scientists, and architects, contemporary artworks and highly specialized information will be displayed in a way that can be intuitively felt. By making the museum a place of sensory learning, new ecological theories and practices will be developed through discussions and workshops throughout the exhibition period.

A platform for encounters between tradition and modernity

Ishikawa Prefecture is home to venerable crafts such as Wajima lacquerware, Suzu ware, and Kutani ware. In our museum, Wajima lacquerware craftsmen, who evacuated to Kanazawa after the Noto Peninsula earthquake on New Year's Day, will exhibit their project "rediscover," in which they use kintsugi, a technique for restoring pottery damaged by the earthquake using lacquer and gold, to give it a new form. Nigerian artist Otobong Nkanga will collaborate with several local craftspeople to create sculptures that tell their stories.

Here, contemporary art rediscovers tradition, giving rise to new forms of creation.
